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VAN BREAKFAST



Van is famous for its breakfast. There are nearly sixty breakfast houses in Van. The city attracts many tourists because of its breakfast. It has got the Guinness Record for the "World's most crowded breakfast table" with 51,793 people. Van breakfast is very famous and delicious. The breakfast houses open from

early hours in the morning to late hours in the afternoon.

All the breakfast food is natural. There are not any bakery products in Van breakfast. There are a lot of plates on the table. Уоц can find four different kinds of cheese. These are herby cheese, white cheese, braided and kashar cheese. There are also cucumbers, tomatoes, black and green olives, roasted meat and sausage egg, jam and bread. The



bread is specially-prepared lavash. There is some authentic honey with clotted cream on the breakfast table. They are served with some walnuts. They have a unique taste with some loaves of warm bread.

There isn't any chocolate at the breakfast. However, you can find some regional breakfast foods such as cacik, murtuga and kavut. Cacik is strained yogurt with cucumber. Murtuga is cooked with oil, flour and egg. Lastly, there are roasted wheat flour, oil and sugar in kavut. Murtuga and kavut are very delicious with a spoon of Van honey. You can drink a glass of black tea or milk. The price is generally between 15 and 30 Turkish liras per person.




